



## Total Grazing Pressure Projects

**Q: I've just finished some fencing, can I be reimbursed for works that I have already done?**

A: No, we will not reimburse you for works already underway or completed. You should not begin works until a contract has been issued and signed.

**Q: Can I apply for multiple projects?**

A: You can only submit one proposal for a Total Grazing Pressure Project, however you may also submit one proposal for a Riparian Project.

**Q: I have a 2015 Groundcover Program contract, can I apply again?**

A: If you have a current 2015 contract you may reapply for new project, however we will consider the risk of both projects not being completed on time during the assessment phase.

**Q: My property is located across two LLS regions, how do I apply?**

A: To be eligible for a Total Grazing Pressure Project, the majority of the proposed works must be located in the Western Region. For further assistance on this please contact one of our staff members.

**Q: I just want to upgrade my boundary fence, why do I have to enclose an area?**

A: To ensure that total grazing pressure is being effectively managed, we require areas to be enclosed with the minimum standard fencing specified in the Guidelines and Conditions. This way the number of grazing animals in the area can be effectively managed and the likelihood of project success is higher.

**Q: I think my monitoring from past projects is out of date, how can I check?**

A: Please contact your local office or project officer to verify. If your monitoring for 2015 is out-of-date you can submit your report before 24 March 2016 to be eligible to apply.

**Q: How much can I apply for?**

A: There is no upper limit on how much you can apply for, however the project must be achievable within the allocated time frame. As a result, proposals seeking a contribution of \$50,000 or more from Local Land Services Western Region will be heavily scrutinised for the risk of incompleteness. Also note that the investment per hectare is considered during assessment.

**Q: How do I know what my Western Lands Lease, Lot or DP numbers are?**

A: You can usually find these numbers on the rates notice from Crown Lands or from your relevant Local Government. Note that these are not listed on your Local Land Services rates notice.

**Q: I want to manage weeds, control pests and do some training but there doesn't seem to be anything in this program for these activities?**

A: Refer to our Western Region Small Land Management Grants Program, which is continually open for applications for these types of activities.
