## OUR YEAR IN REVIEW Murray Local Land Services



On behalf of the Board of Murray Local Land Services, I am pleased to present the Murray Local Land Services Annual Achievements Report for 2017.

While this report provides a great snapshot of the year, there have also been a number of highlights, including:

1. The NSW Landcare and Local Land Services Conference – the regional Landcare and producer group community, in cooperation with Local Land Services, planned and delivered a magnificent event. One of the highlights for me was the inaugural inclusion of an Aboriginal theme. I am sure this will significantly increase interaction between the Aboriginal community and Landcare across the state.

2. Reinvigorating the local community advisory and Aboriginal community advisory groups. These groups are crucial in connecting the board and staff to the broader community.

3. Planning and hosting a major inter-state and multi-partner exercise to test our ability to respond to a major animal health disease outbreak. These exercises play a major role in ensuring our produce can continue to access export markets.

Our success would not be possible without the continued support and commitment of a large number of individual landholders, Aboriginal communities, Landcare and producer groups, volunteers, government agencies across New South Wales, Victoria and South Australia, local councils, industry groups, schools, research institutions and our funding partners via the National Landcare Program and Catchment Action NSW program.

Finally, I would like to extend the board's thanks to the Murray Local Land Services team, who have displayed commitment and passion in working with the community. On behalf of the Murray Local Land Services Board, I acknowledge their contributions and commend them on their work.

In closing, I look forward to working with you to make 2018 a successful and profitable year.

## 2017 Snapshot



We assisted 16 community groups to enhance and protect the environment and participate in sustainable agriculture by providing \$272,000 in incentive funding.



We're the boots on the ground to support agriculture and animals in an emergency and responded to five emergencies in 2017. More than 40 per cent of staff have been trained to assist in an emergency or biosecurity outbreak.



We worked with land managers to establish one new wild dog management plan for the Tumbarumba area and continued with our two existing wild dog management plans with coordination and support.



We worked with landholders to assist them to develop 130 km of electric wild dog exclusion fencing on impacted landholdings and helped coordinate wild dog trapping efforts.



We conducted aerial baiting for wild dogs across 5 parks and nature reserves and 3 forests using 8,000 wild dog baits, alongside ground baiting efforts, covering 120,000 ha.



We support Aboriginal people to care for Country, share traditional land management knowledge and help protect and strengthen Aboriginal cultural heritage. More than 33,000 ha of land with Aboriginal cultural value was managed along with five Aboriginal sites.



We helped increase the capacity of land managers to improve primary production and natural resource management through 112 awareness raising events.



Our vets and biosecurity officers attended more than 1,220 general consultations and conducted 334 disease investigations.

## Our on ground achievements

We enhanced and rehabilitated 1,234 ha of land and protected 517 ha of vegetation through fencing

We negotiated **37** voluntary conservation agreements, protecting and sustaining **1,091 ha** of land for biodiversity enhancement Our autumn and spring fox baiting programs resulted in 450 landholders laying 66,000 baits across 823,399 ha.

We provided **education** and **training** workshops to 83 land managers to support and help coordinate group control programs for wild dogs, foxes, pigs and rabbits.

We managed 52,175 ha of travelling stock reserves and issued 1,117 walking permits (including 759 routine stock movement permits) for stock movement.

The Murray Regional Strategic Weed Management Plan was endorsed and implemented to protect the **region** from biosecurity threats.

To protect market access, we issued 130 property identification codes.

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Our customer service team fielded 10,500 customer enquiries

We issued **32 media** releases about programs and events.

Nearly 60 staff were trained or upskilled.
